

## TOWN OF PEMBROKE GUIDE TO RECYCLING

**WHERE:** PEMBROKE TOWN HALL  
**WHEN:** 1<sup>ST</sup> AND 3<sup>RD</sup> Saturdays of the Month  
**TIME:** 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M.

### MATERIALS

**NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES & CATALOGS** – Anything that comes with your regular newspaper. Magazines delivered to a newsstand. All catalogs, phone books, junk mail, envelopes, writing paper, books (soft or hard cover).

**CARDBOARD** – Corrugated cardboard, brown paper bags, cereal boxes and all paperboard like boxes.

**GLASS BOTTLES** – All Bottles clear, green and brown, food and beverage containers.

**METAL CANS** – All metal food & beverage containers (cans).

**PLASTIC** – Plastic food, soap & beverage containers with threaded cap. EXCEPT Wide Mouth Containers. Look on the bottom of the container for # 1 & # 2 only.

### WHAT TO PLACE IN RECYCLING BOX

Newspapers must be in cardboard boxes, paper bags or plastic bags. Papers do not have to be tied.

Remove all tape, staples and strapping.

Break down all boxes in 3 feet x 3 feet sections and tie.

Rinse all containers. Separate by color. Remove lids, caps and rings. Labels DO NOT have to be removed. NO BROKEN GLASS. Flatten all paper boxes. No Wide mouth containers such as yogurt, cottage cheese, chip dip, etc..

### WHAT TO PLACE IN TRASH

**ITEMS THAT ARE NOT RECYCLABLE.** Napkins, tissue paper, paper towels, wax paper or wrapping paper. Waxed corrugated cardboard stained with oil, cardboard lined with foam, cores from carpet rolls or any items made from laminated sheets of paper or cardboard. Ceramic bottles and other ceramic items. Flowerpots, crystal, light bulbs, mirror or window glass, heat resistant ovenware, hypodermic syringes or needles and eyeglasses. No batteries of any type. Propane Cylinders, silverware, metal/cardboard containers (ex. Frozen Juice), small appliances, metal cookware or tin foil. Anti-Freeze or motor oil containers (because of residue), furniture, plates, plastic bags, tableware, and medicine bottles. Plexiglas, fast food containers, snack bags, yogurt and cottage cheese containers, Tupperware or any other plastic ware.
